Student Skills

In school, as part of our Community Skills learning, students had previously benefited from joining the local library in Ringwood where they had opportunities to work with the librarians and use technology to look up books linked with our Main Lesson and with their own interests. The Covid-19 restrictions meant this had to pause but, in Briery, with some creative thinking, we were able to turn a small room into our very own library, with age-appropriate books and upcycled book shelves.

Here, students had a chance to be our very own Briery librarians. They became increasingly confident and were able to practise librarian target-skills, from placing the books into alphabetical order or according to a category such as fiction, non-fiction, Main Lesson, specific interests (birds, Disney characters, cats and dogs, bagpipes, music and minions etc) or by collection: Tom Gates, Roald Dahl, David Walliams, cooking, Arts and Crafts.

From this experience, one of our students subsequently shared with our Careers Adviser that one of her favourite jobs would be to work with books. A volunteering opportunity presented itself at her local library in Fordingbridge and a CV containing relevant work experience onsite and offsite, outstanding presentation during the job interview, her positive approach to the demands of the job and her inquisitive personality driven towards new learning opportunities are the visible ingredients of her success story.

She is now working under the supervision of the Fordingbridge library staff once a week where she adapts and generalises the skills acquired in the school's library. Interacting with a variety of library users in a safe and supportive work place is a wonderful achievement.

Parental vision and high aspirations were backed by the whole school team since her first day at the Sheiling, nearly three years ago - a wonderful journey.

My Library

'I started working in the library in Fordingbridge in December and I go every Tuesday afternoon to do my job.

I love going to the library. I do lots of jobs when I am there. I help to put the books back on the shelves from the trolley. I have to put them in the right order.

I tidy up the Lego models and put the Lego away. I stamp some books and cross out the barcodes. I did sharpening pencils. I do the display in the children's section. I did some health and safety training on the computer which was a bit hard to understand and I needed some help with.

I love working in the library.'

Norooz

School students learned about the celebration of Norooz (Nowruz). Norooz is the Iranian or Persian New Year celebrated around the world. It is based on the Iranian Solar Hijri calendar, on the spring equinox—on or around 21st March. It marks happy "new day" or "happy new year" in the Iranian culture.

The students were lucky to hear a little more about Iranian culture from a member of staff including how Norooz marks the first day of spring and some of the wonderful customs and traditions of this warm and welcoming celebration.

Students enjoyed discussing the seven items of Haft-seen and their meaning along with other

symbolic items and of course getting to try out some traditional Iranian delicacies.



Happy Horse Riding

In school, classes have been taking part in horse riding therapy sessions at The Fortune Centre, a specialist centre less than 30 minutes away from our site and based in the New Forest.

Students benefit in a variety of ways and learn life skills by doing something they connect with. Horses provide the connection and they can develop the skills of students who can find a traditional classroom environment trickier. Students smile from arrival to departure and they have a fantastic time and become more confident with each session.




Budding Illustrator
